☐ American Coot	G	at the reservoir
☐ American Crow	G	in big groups on higher trails
☐ American Kestrel	F	perched on higher chaparral or on high power lines
☐ Anna's Hummingbird	G	everywhere
☐ Barn Owl	L	in groves of big oaks on Botanical Trail
☐ Belted Kingfisher	L	occasional fly-bys along Escondido Creek
☐ Black Phoebe	G	perched or flying above coastal sage scrub
☐ Black-chinned Hummingbird	L	summer in big oaks by Escondido Creek/Botanical Trail
☐ Black-headed Grosbeak	F-G	in big oaks along Escondido Creek during summer
☐ Blue-gray Gnatcatcher	L	in oaks at Ridgetop Picnic Area
☐ Brewer's Blackbird	G	along roads on higher trails
☐ Bushtit	G	in groups going bush to bush, everywhere
☐ California Gnatcatcher	L	in coastal sage scrub
□ California Quail	F	running or flying low at top of Way Up Trail
☐ California Thrasher	G	in open chaparral on higher trails
☐ California Towhee	G	everywhere
☐ Cassin's Kingbird	L	in big oaks along Escondido Creek
☐ Cedar Waxwing	F	in groups, looking for fruits during early winter
☐ Cliff Swallow	F	occasional fly-bys on Lake Hodges Overlook Trail during summer
☐ Common Poorwill	L	along Lake Hodges Overlook Trail and Witch Trail
☐ Common Raven	F	in twos or threes on higher trails
☐ Common Yellowthroat	G	like to nest near water
☐ Cooper's Hawk	F	in tall oaks on Botanical Trail (perched)
☐ Double-crested Cormorant	F	at the reservoir, on Witch Trail
☐ Fox Sparrow	F	in open chaparral and coastal sage scrub during winter
☐ Great Blue Heron	F	standing near the shores of Escondido creek
☐ Great Egret	G	at the reservoir
☐ Great Horned Owl	L	in groves of big oaks on Botanical Trail
☐ Green Heron	L-F	at the reservoir, occasionally on Escondido Creek
☐ Hermit Thrush	L	in big oaks along Escondido Creek
☐ Horned Lark	L	
☐ House Finch	G	along roads on higher trails

☐ Hutton's Vireo	L-F	in big oaks along Escondido Creek
☐ Killdeer	F	on grassy meadows, top of Way Up Trail
☐ Lesser Goldfinch	G	in open country on higher trails
☐ Mallard	G	along Escondido Creek
☐ Mourning Dove	G	everywhere
☐ Northern Flicker	F-G	flying everywhere (odd bird making odd noises)
□ Northern Harrier	L-F	in the air, flying low, at top of Way Up Trail
☐ Northern Mockingbird	F	in open chaparral on higher trails
☐ Nuttall's Woodpecker	L-F	in big oaks along Escondido Creek
☐ Oak Titmouse	F	in oak woods along Escondido Creek
☐ Orange-crowned Warbler	F	in dense chaparral on Way Up Trail
☐ Red-shouldered Hawk	L-F	in tall oaks on Botanical Trail (perched)
☐ Red-tailed Hawk	G	in the air, perched in trees
☐ Roadrunner	L	on roads on higher trails (exceedingly rare)
☐ Rock Wren	L	Lake Hodges Overlook Trail and Witch Trail
☐ Ruby-crowned Kinglet	F	in big oaks along Escondido Creek
☐ Sage Sparrow	F	in chaparral, in water containers at top of Way Up Trail
☐ Scrub Jay	G	everywhere
☐ Snowy Egret	G	at the reservoir, occasionally on Escondido Creek
☐ Song Sparrow	G	near water
☐ Spotted Towhee	G	in open chaparral
☐ Turkey Vulture	G	in the air at top of Way Up Trail
☐ Western Bluebird	F	in open chaparral on higher trails
☐ Western Meadowlark	F	in very open meadows on higher trails
☐ White-crowned Sparrow	G	in open chaparral and coastal sage scrub during winter
☐ White-tailed Kite 1	F	flying above the oaks by Escondido Creek
☐ White-throated Swift	L	occasional fly-bys on upper trails
☐ Wrentit	F	in open chaparral on higher trails
☐ Yellow-rumped Warbler	G	in open chaparral (sometimes called "Audubon's Warbler")
